MakerSpace Policies

- 1. Before using the MakerSpace, Makers must
 - a. Complete and sign a MakerSpace Agreement and MakerSpace Waiver
 - b. Anyone from the public is welcome to use the MakerSpace. <u>If</u> patrons have an LHPL library card, they must be in good standing, have a current address on file, and have **no fines above \$10.00.**
 - c. (Minors without a valid ID or library card must have a certified parent or guardian accompany them to the MakerSpace.)
- 2. Makers must "check-in" with staff and sign the guest book each time they use MakerSpace.
- 3. Makers between the ages of 8 and 13 must always be accompanied by a parent or guardian.
- 4. Makers <u>must participate</u> in mandatory safety training to use equipment in the MakerSpace.
- 5. When using tools that <u>do not require certification</u>, the Maker certifies that he/she is capable of using the tool or equipment safely and properly.
 - a. Cricut cutting machine
 - b. Sewing Machine
 - c. Embroidery Machine
 - d. Button Maker Machine
 - e. Tumbler/Mug Heat Press
 - f. Wood Burning
- 6. When using tools that <u>do require certification</u>, the Maker must agree to participate in safety training for the following equipment before use:
 - a. Sketch 3D Printer
 - b. VHS/DVD Converter
- 7. LHPL staff is available to assist in explaining the operation of tools and equipment and will make materials such as manuals available upon request.
- 8. LHPL provides access to safety supplies in the MakerSpace. (safety glasses, gloves, first aid kit, and fire extinguisher).
- 9. Unless previously scheduled for use by staff, tools and equipment are available on a first-come, first-served basis for use in MakerSpace only.
- 10. LHPL reserves the right to refuse entry to or remove from the MakerSpace anyone who violates its policies.
- 11. Equipment in the Makerspace may be used only for lawful purposes. The public will not be permitted to use equipment to create material:
 - a. Prohibited by local state or federal law.
 - b. Unsafe, harmful, dangerous, or poses an immediate threat to the well-being of others.
 - c. Obscene or otherwise inappropriate for the library environment.
 - d. In violation of another's intellectual property rights. (For example, the 3D printer will be used to reproduce materials subject to copyright, patent, or trademark protections.
- 12. LHPL reserves the right to refuse any request to use equipment in the space.
- 13. LHPL is not liable for any damaged materials or media belonging to persons utilizing the equipment in the facility's space.
- 14. The copyright law of the United States governs the making of copies or other reproductions of copyrighted materials. The person using the equipment is liable for any infringement.
